Agenda topic Recognize guests and new members | Presenter Matt Rehani

Zack and Kathrin Carter from AAA Trailer joined us to provide advice and knowledge about major items of trailer maintenance. Here's what they recommend we pay attention to annually:

- Wheel bearings
- Tire wear – uneven or excessive wear means an axle needs attention. Dry rot means it's time to replace the tires to avoid a blow-out.
- Brakes, wheels and emergency (breakaway).
- Emergency brake battery. The lifespan of this battery is

typically three to four years. It is supposed to be automatically recharged by the tow vehicle or a system in the trailer itself, but sometimes the system doesn't work. If the battery dies too often, there's a problem. Verify the battery strength with a voltage checker.

- Trailer power cable. If the cable is damaged test the system by activating the trailer brakes to test the connection. Make sure cable is installed and plugged in properly. If the cable isn't right, running lights and turn signals might not work.
- Running lights that don't work might be caused by a blown fuse on the tow vehicle.
- Deck boards. Pull the floor mats and check the underlying boards for rot and damage.
- Roof maintenance. Skylights, vents and other openings on the roof (seams) need to be checked for leaks. If the roof is black, it's time for a recoat.
- Hitch receiver. The pin receptacle can become misshapen from wear and tear. AAA can fix the problem, often by welding the hole to 5/8", thereby restoring an elongated pin hole to its round shape.
- Other AAA services
  - Generator parts and service
  - Refrigerator repair
  - Diagnose and repair issues with the tow vehicle
  - Install trailer hitches (fifth-wheel and receiver hitches)
  - Trailer and truck accessories, including running boards, batteries, bed covers
- Prices
  - Bearings replaced at \$95/axel, plus \$85/hour for labor
- Appointments
  - AAA is booked up for the rest of March 2023
  - Call 575-388-1919 to schedule your trailer for service

Public Service/Communications | Presenter Gerry Engel

**Where's Melissa?** Gerry advised that Melissa Green and a couple of other trail worthies like Cheryl Roth are clearing the trail on a multi-day project at White Rocks (see page 5). Melissa reports that the work is going well.

GBCH has several future projects in the campfire, although most are being re-scheduled because, you know, weather. (Please refer to the [current trail schedule](#) for dates and details.)

**Money and stuff.** The Gila chapter has some grant proposals in the works, but we won't belabor the details right now, except for this one:

**Great American Outdoors Act.** The volunteer agreement is being processed for the \$100K from the GAO). This impressive largess from taxpayers and lawmakers will be spent to un-defer historically deferred-maintenance trails in the Gila. Sometimes GBCH is pressed to allocate all the funds from a particular grant within the time specified, but that's not the case with the GAOA money. We can undertake projects supported by this grant over several years. The money is just for GBCH to use; not sharing it with any other entity. It's a lot of bucks and we can accomplish good things with it. (See the [trail schedule](#) for details.)

**Trails.** At some point before the desert mountains get too hot, a cool project outside Glenwood NM will proceed after being cancelled (scheduled for March 25). GBCH riders plan to go out and clear the big logs, while the hikers brush and clear smaller stuff from the trail. It's supposed to be a one-day detail, but Glenwood being a fur distance from most places, GBCH workers can drive up the day before and camp at Glenwood Community Park. The park has no corrals, but we have permission to use the arena there to secure livestock. The project will employ crosscut saw only.

**Sawyer certifications.** It's a little bit tricky to administer training certification for GBCH sawyers. Two certifications are required:

- Sawyer certifications (crosscut and chainsaw) are valid for three years.
- A current certification in first aid, an honor valid for just two years. The USFS puts on a one-day first aid class but the Service has no such classes scheduled and the safety officer has moved on to other logs. Alternatives exist, such Wilderness 1<sup>st</sup> Aid (for first responders) at WNMU. Gerry will follow up.

For chainsaws, everybody who uses one in the forest has to be certified. For crosscut saw, one person on the saw must be certified, but lacking that, a crosscut-certified individual on hand suffices. The USFS sawyer certification course (which they need to do soon), consists of a three-day block of classroom lecture, followed by field work with real live saws and how to use them and maintain them safely.

<sup>1</sup> Cookie branding: An exercise in which participants use a crosscut saw to carve off a slice from one end of a log. Then they get to use a hot branding iron (GBCH and USFS brands) to sear the charred logo into the log slice (the "cookie"). They get to keep the cookie and everybody is happy about that. Plus the air smells of smoky pine pitch.
